I was in a very dark place when I was introduced to Michael from Prison Fellowship. Soon, I began to understand that God was not the reason I was in prison, but that God was actually my answer.


Michael gave me a Bible and other Christian books to read and on the 18th of January 2024, I committed my life to God, accepting Jesus as my Saviour. After attending Lifesplan group based on the 10 commandments, I was released from prison at the beginning of April 2024. I was then invited to the Prison Fellowship Hub where I met Neil and Robin. I was invited to Lifesplan, which became a great place to meet with people who have been through similar experiences. The fellowship, praise and exploration through God's Word have done wonders for my faith. I have been introduced to some great people in this group and the discussions have helped my understanding of God's grace and purpose for my life.

I will finish with a few words from a favourite song we sing in Lifesplan 'Lead On Good Shepherd' by Lynda Randle and my favourite verse in God's word:


You've walked me through the valley But you never steered me wrong So, lead on good shepherd Lead on.

The mission is God's work and has His truth at the centre. It is very encouraging to see God moving in men's lives during this time. We are reminded in God's Word to "know the truth and the truth will set us free". That's what prison ministry is all about. For some men, it's their first opportunity to hear truth from scripture and for others it's a reminder of something they heard in the past.

We give thanks for all those who testified, ministered and prayed with the men throughout the week. Some men have remained in contact with our speakers and we believe this is God continuing a work He started in their lives. Many men responded to their need for Jesus and committed to changing their lives. Pray that they will grow in knowledge and in their relationship with God.

Men in prison are broken; they know they have made a mess of their lives and can't fix it themselves.



If you are a Christian and reading this, you will understand that's exactly where you were before you got saved. We know Jesus loves each of those men in prison and we also know He is the one who calls, convicts, converts and keeps: "look unto me and be ye saved" Isaiah 45:22.

Always remember the light shines brightest in the darkest places. We are carriers of light in a dark world. I believe prison ministry is only possible by God's will and the prayers of His people. Thank you for praying and I believe one day many others that you may never meet here will thank you too. Keep praying for this work and praising God that we are all part of it together.

New Volunteer Neil

Hi, I'm Neil. I enjoy running, surfing and hanging out with my horse. One day last year while reading my Bible, I felt challenged by the verse, "I was in prison, and you came to visit me."

I felt frustrated; why would I want to help prisoners? I asked God to soften my heart and help me understand. At that time, Instagram started sharing videos from 'God Behind Bars' showing prisoners worshipping God, repenting and giving their lives to Jesus. Though quite different to PF, it really inspired me. I began to google and came across Prison Fellowship. Soon after, I met with Grace and signed up to volunteer with a specific desire to serve in the prisons.

I started off by helping to run *Sycamore Tree* in Hydebank. On the way there, I prayed for courage, safety, and the words I was to speak, believing that I was a vessel for His works and that God would be working through me.

Meeting the lads, hearing their stories, and getting the opportunity to share the idea of a life outside of crime, hopefully with Jesus at the centre of it, really encouraged me. We also shared basic truths about the consequences of their crimes and the ripple effect they have.



On week six, some of the guys read out very personal and heartfelt apology letters to their victims. I was blown away by that as there were prison officers there. We celebrated with a huge lunch which gave me another opportunity to get to know the lads a bit better.

More recently, I was part of a group of six guys that played football against the students in Hydebank. The lads loved to rake around and have a laugh but halfway through the matches we would sit and listen to a PF volunteer share their testimony or word from God. The prisoners, from all different backgrounds, religions and faiths, were all incredibly respectful. They listened intently, clapped and encouraged the person sharing. I couldn't believe how well they received the good news of Jesus. It's just finished but I'm already looking forward to next year!

During one of our meetings in Magilligan, I asked the men, "what do you think of the chaplains?" Their unanimous reply was that the chaplains would do whatever they could for you, help however possible, be there when you needed support, and were always ready with a cheerful word of encouragement. These men, by their own words, are encouraged, treated generously with due diligence, and all of these things are shown in a cheerful manner.

I have been volunteering once a week in Magilligan since 2018. My day involves a walk around the blocks and calling into the cells for a chat, followed by an afternoon meeting in the worship centre. Afterwards, I visit the Foyle View area, where depending on numbers, we have



another meeting. Should the men not be back from their work, we visit the rooms and check in with them.

I also help to run *Sycamore Tree* which has proven to be of immense benefit to the men. The understory of Zacchaeus comes through and each participant is clearly moved in the most personal of ways. The afternoon then allows us the opportunity to visit some of those who took part, looking to put into practice more of Romans 12:8.
