


Everything for Jesus

It was such a joy to gather and celebrate how the Lord has blessed and worked through the ministry of Prison Fellowship Northern Ireland over the past year. Each staff member, along with our volunteers, gave brief updates on the ministry, highlighting moments where we clearly saw God's hand at work. We praised God for His goodness, His faithful provision, and His ongoing answers to our prayers.

We heard about the impact of *Sycamore Tree* in our prisons and the many prisoners who have participated in these courses across all three facilities. Walter and Paul - two of our dedicated volunteers - spoke about the powerful experiences they've had and the privilege it has been to facilitate the groups. 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Welcome On Board

It was during the 1980s that I was first introduced to Prison Fellowship NI when the late James McIlroy visited my home church, Woodvale Presbyterian, to speak about what was then pioneering work in Northern Ireland. His insights into the needs of those in prison resonated at a time when many from my local area, including some I had gone to school with, were finding their way into the prison system.

My interest in prison life and the plight of those residing in our prisons was further encouraged when I found myself working for the NI Prison Service from 1991-97, from 2010-13 and from 2017-23. I was to realise that rehabilitation must always be the cornerstone of the work within our prisons. It was President George W. Bush who said: "When the gates of the prison open, the path ahead should lead to a better life."

I have seen firsthand the impact PFNI staff and volunteers have within our prisons: the friendships developed and the encouragement given, often in times of loneliness and desperation. PF staff and volunteers, working alongside Prison Chaplains, should never be underestimated. Their care for prison staff who undertake what is complex and challenging work is also something I greatly appreciated.

The Sycamore Tree project, a restorative justice programme delivered by PFNI, is making a very significant contribution in challenging behaviours and focusing individuals on the impact of their actions and the importance of true remorse and new beginnings.

Christmas Hope is a practical demonstration of compassion and concerns for those in prison and their families that is making a real difference.

Someone once said that, "people don't care what you know until they know that you care."

Prison Fellowship staff, volunteers and supporters really care and that is why I was delighted when I was invited to join the PFNI Board. I look forward to serving with you in the days ahead.

Hope Behind Bars

Four months into my prison sentence, I found myself at the back of a PF meeting. My faith had always been there, but it wasn't strong. For a long time, I felt something was missing from my life. All I ever craved was happiness, and after each meeting, I felt joy and a sense of belonging.

I kept attending and, in May 2024, gave my life to Jesus. I knew I was on a new path of salvation, but I also felt God urging me to forgive my abuser. Without forgiveness, I couldn't fully change and would keep making the same mistakes. With the Holy Spirit's help, I was able to forgive.

These PF meetings have brought peace and purpose to my life. For the first time, I have good people around me who truly care—my brothers and sisters in Christ. Christianity has given me hope and shown me that my life has value. Because of Christ, I'm no longer consumed by hate, vengeance, or trauma.

The story of Joseph is my favorite Bible story because I relate to his journey: abandoned, imprisoned, and forgotten. Yet, his faith carried him through, and after years of torment, he overcame with God by his side.

When I was first sentenced, my thoughts were to keep my head down and get my time done. I knew I had committed an offence but, in many ways, I thought of mine as a victimless crime, supplying willing users with a product they desired.

On completion of the Sycamore Tree course, I now understand the wider effects of my actions; how it affects communities, especially those more vulnerable and underprivileged, and how it has a direct negative impact on my family and friends.

I can only recommend Sycamore Tree to other prisoners which I believe will bring them to a place to reflect on their actions. I only wish I had taken this course many years ago. Thank you, Paul, Claire, June and all the PF staff.

Minister Visit

It was very encouraging to have Justice Minster Naomi Long attend the final session of Sycamore Tree in Maghaberry along with a delegation from the Dept of Justice/NIPS.

She sat in on Session 6 and listened to the men give an overview of the previous weeks and what they had gained from attending. She then listened to each of the ten participants' letters either read personally or by a PF volunteer or staff member. This was particularly poignant as none of the men were aware who would be visiting until five mins before the guests arrived.

The minister then presented the men with their attendance certificates and spoke personally to each one, congratulating them on their achievements and hard work. She was also very encouraging to PF staff and volunteers,

thanking them for delivering the programme, but also saying that we need to be able to move restorative justice work forward.

We pray for the Justice Minister and that God might bless the work of *Sycamore Tree* as it continues to transform lives within and without prison walls.
