Facing Your Giants

In June, the NI Prison Service contacted PFNI about running weekly courses over July and August based on PFNI's Lifesplan groups in Maghaberry and Magilligan. The request in itself shows the favour and trust that PF has built, so we quickly agreed and started to plan.

As we were looking at the life of King David recently, we decided to call the course 'Facing your Giants'. It would address the various giants the men on the course experiences such as alcohol, drugs, and mental health issues.

We ran the first group one day a week and designed a booklet for the men to work through. Sessions started at 9.30 am until lunchtime. We ate together and discussed what we had talked about while getting to know the men better.

After lunch, we brought in guest speakers that the men could relate to. Ian McDowall and Arthur White from 'Toughtalk' spoke about their past as debt collectors, doormen, a bodybuilder and a powerlifter and the dark paths that their lifestyles had led them down. When they were at the lowest parts in their lives they cried out to God, "If you're real, show me!" God graciously answered their pleas for help.

At the end of the first course, one of the men said what he heard helped him resist taking revenge, instead choosing to pray and ask God for strength. Many commented on the guest speakers' testimonies and how God had defeated their 'giants'. They all took Bibles when leaving - what an answer to prayer!

Please remember these men as they start their spiritual journeys and for wisdom for PFNI staff and volunteers as we walk with and mentor them. We give thanks for the opportunities that the courses have given to teach God's word and for open and honest questions.

Just Ten

PFNI runs a Lifesplan group in Maghaberry Prison called 'Just Ten'. They meet each Tuesday morning at 10 am in Foyle House for an hour. We are currently following a course where we discuss, debate, understand, and break down the Ten Commandments. The course is a 10-week commitment, with one commandment addressed each week.

Due to the room size, the group is limited to a maximum of 10 men. We are currently at week 5 and have enjoyed maximum numbers since its commencement. We always start with a hot coffee, a choccie biscuit and general day-to-day chatter before getting down to business, so to speak.

The prisoners enjoy open, honest conversation and are incredibly respectful. They are eager to learn and often discuss their own life difficulties and how these ten ancient laws translate into modern-day society. The commandments are usually a starting point for learning respect, integrity, and the sanctity of life. It has been surprising how many had never heard of the Ten Commandments!

We finish with prayer, followed by a short reflection and one-to-one conversations before the guys are returned to their cells.

I continue to receive positive feedback from prisoners and prison authorities alike. Several guys are waiting to attend, should any 'fall by the wayside'.

Please remember this group in your prayers, that they will encounter God, grow in faith and find purpose, giving hope behind bars.

Aftercare - Female

Pray for N. who very sadly lives in complete fear in her own home. Many things need to change. Pray that she would be able to put herself first and make brave choices and for her protection.

Pray for Lynne and Joanne as they work together, planning the way ahead to continue to best support women in custody and on their release. Many great things are happening and we are thankful but we just feel there is 'more needed'.

Pray for L. She has been in prison so often in her young life. This is her longest time on the outside. She is doing great, praise the Lord! Keep praying for her and especially her heart to help others like herself.

Aftercare - Male

Please pray for the leaders and volunteers in Lifesplan. They meet every week to provide worship, teaching, prayer and hospitality to released prisoners. Pray God continues to bless this group.

Pray for the connections that Prison Aftercare has made in the community. Pray that the local support organisations and churches will accept invitations to visit and meet released prisoners at PF.

Pray for D. He is looking for a job and would love to find something soon. It is very difficult for him due to his past and current conditions. Pray for help and understanding for the right opportunity to open up for him in God's time.

Pray for Ken, a faithful volunteer who got married at the end of August, that the Lord will bless him and his wife.

As we prepare for Christmas Hope, pray we will be able to obtain all the information we need for the hampers and to make this work well.
